We proudly recognized our two newest endowed chairs, Bill Conner and Bill Leonard, at a dinner at Graylyn in November. Endowed professorships are a longstanding tradition at Wake Forest; they honor faculty members who have embodied the teacher-scholar ideal. Bill Conner teaches a variety of courses in Biology, and his research expertise is animal communication. He is the first David and Lelia Farr Professor of Innovation, Creativity, and Entrepreneurship. Bill Leonard was the founding Dean of the Divinity School and specializes in Baptist Studies and American Religious Studies. He is the first James and Marilyn Dunn Chair of Baptist Studies. Please join me in congratulating them when you see them.

In addition to building a great faculty as part of our strategic plan, we are also committed to increasing campus vibrancy. A number of events this winter and spring will interest to a wide array of faculty and students, among them the MLK Celebrations. The university will commemorate the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in a series of community events that culminate in Wait Chapel on January 23 with CNN Anchor Soledad O'Brien speaking on social justice. On Saturday, January 21, regional schools, including UNC Chapel Hill and Winston-Salem State University, will compete in the 14th Annual MLK Invitational Basketball Tournament, and on Sunday, January 22, the Office of Multicultural Affairs has organized the much-anticipated 7th Annual MLK Gospel Fest, held in Brendle Recital Hall.

From March 23-25, the first Words Awake! WFU Writers Symposium will convene many generations of ink-slingers with ties to Wake Forest. The Rethinking Success Conference in April will bring leaders from across the country to examine the significance of liberal arts education today. Panelists and participants will assess whether higher education is adequately preparing students for life after college. Former US Secretary of State Dr. Condoleezza Rice will deliver the keynote address, "The State of America and the Role of Higher Education."

I hope you will join your colleagues, students, and staff in attending these campus events this semester. You will find details on the pages that follow. Best wishes as you start another semester.

- **Faculty Panels on Public Engagement:** supports faculty participation, individually or as a panel, at professional conferences, particularly those that highlight public engagement or service learning

- **Engaged Teaching and Scholarship:** to enhance service-learning and community-based participatory research (CBPR) opportunities for faculty, students, and community partners throughout the year; all faculty are encouraged to explore service learning as a pedagogy and the best principles and practices of CBPR in higher education. Additional funding for engaged scholarship will be available.
